

A guide for preservice teachers on Permission to Teach in Queensland

Welcome and orientation

Purpose of this guide

This guide is for preservice teachers studying an initial teacher education (ITE) program and approved with Permission to Teach (PTT). It is intended to help you navigate the PTT process, ask the right questions of your school, and know your rights and responsibilities to feel confident in your role.

What is Permission to Teach (PTT)?


PTT allows individuals who are not yet registered teachers to teach in Queensland schools, under certain conditions. It's an opportunity to gain extended classroom experience in Queensland contemporary school settings, before seeking teacher registration.

As a PTT holder in a school, you are considered an approved Queensland teacher for the period specified in your PTT approval notice. You are a member of a diverse register of more than 120,000 teaching professionals across the state.

What you need to know early on

- Your PTT is subject to certain parameters, as detailed on your approval notice from the QCT make sure you understand them. Working outside your approved parameters is a general offence under QCT legislation.
- You should be appointed a mentor or supervisor and be supported by your school while under PTT.
- · You're expected to continue your ITE studies to move toward provisional registration.

Must-do administration tasks



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Know your role and responsibilities

Check in with your mentor or supervisor

Your school should appoint you a mentor or supervisor to support you during the length of your PTT position.

Once you have confirmed your teaching timetable with your employer, you might like to ask them the following questions:



- What curriculum or programs do I need to follow?
- · Are there existing unit or lesson plans I can use?
- · How are students with diverse learning needs supported?
- · Will I receive release time for planning, professional development, or mentoring?
- · What are the expectations for reporting student progress?
- · Are there opportunities for team teaching or collaborative planning?
- · Who do I report to?

Day-to-day expectations

You are expected to carry out the full non-teaching duties of a teacher while undertaking a PTT (discuss these with your school):

- supervision duties (e.g. playground, bus, and before and after school duty)
- · communicating with parents including parent-teacher meetings
- · attendance at staff meetings and professional development sessions
- adhering to your school's behaviour management and referral processes
- assistance and/or attendance at non-curricular events as directed by your employer (e.g. sports days)

Who else you can collaborate with

Speak to other professionals and colleagues in your school community and don't be afraid to ask questions – teaching is a team effort.

Observe experienced teachers whenever possible and keep a record of your experiences and feedback.



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Professional practice and support

Mentoring and support

- Every PTT teacher should have a designated supervisor or mentor.
- Ask about scheduled check-ins, observations, and feedback.
- Use your mentor to understand school culture, policies, and professional expectations.

Know the standards

- Familiarise yourself with the Australian Professional Standards for Teachers (APST) focussing on the Graduate level.
- Reflect regularly on your development use the standards as a guide.

Key areas to focus on

- · Classroom management strategies
- · Effective lesson planning and assessment
- · Cultural responsiveness and inclusion
- · Building positive relationships
